









Year 3 Carlton Marshes School Trip


On Tuesday 6th June, Year 3 pupils went on a trip to Carlton Marshes Nature Reserve. The objectives of the trip were to explore and identify a range of plants and develop children's understanding of plant life cycles and growth.

The children arrived at the nature reserve filled with excitement after the coach ride and eager to start exploring. We were welcomed to the site by our designated Engagement Officer who spent the day with us leading a variety of fun and interactive activities.



To begin our day, children played a seed game in which they pretended to be seeds, searching for the things they required to grow into plants. They had to collect cards representing air, water, soil, light and warmth without getting caught by hungry birds trying to eat them!

Our Engagement Officer explained pollination and the important role that flowers play in a flowers growing at the marshes. They made



careful observations to identify the shape, number of petals and colour of the different flowers and recorded their data in a table. At first glance, there didn't appear to be many flowers in the field; however, after some searching, the children were shocked at just how many different flowers they spotted! Afterwards, the children became reporters by selecting and

interviewing a plant to find out more about its characteristics. They particularly enjoyed measuring the height of their chosen plant and many even had a go at converting millimetres to centimetres.



Next, everyone went on a nature walk around the marshes with binoculars and bird spotter sheets to see if any wildlife could be spotted. Pupils identified a variety of birds, including swifts, swans and mallards. While waiting patiently in The Lookout, children were even lucky enough to see a marsh harrier and a deer!

Finally, after lunch, the children explored the trees in the woodland area and they were tasked with matching branches to the trees they belonged to. Using their observational skills, they identified Willow, Alder, Hawthorn and Elder trees. The children enjoyed spending the remainder of their time at

Carlton Marshes being artistic, by making leaf and bark rubbings. They loved the beautiful patterns they discovered in the nature around them. One of the children's favourite parts of the day was discovering a tawny owl perched high up in a tree while they were enjoying their colouring.





Year 4 Carlton Marshes School Trip

On Tuesday 23rd May, Year 4 went on a trip to Carlton Marshes. Throughout the day, the children undertook a variety of activities to develop their knowledge of our Science topic, Living Things and Habitats.

In the morning, the children got to try dyke dipping, during which they spotted a whole range of different invertebrates. Using identification sheets, they were able to identify various water-based mini-beasts and selected some to look at more closely, using magnified viewing boxes. After this, the children completed a second creature hunt, but this time it involved looking amongst a whole range of other micro-habitats, such as under logs, in the tall grass and on leaves. Again, the children were able to identify the different mini-beasts and discuss their different features.

We ended our day with a walk around the marshes and going into one of the look-out huts to do some bird spotting using binoculars. We spotted lots of different animals and birds, including hawks, swans, water deers and sparrows.

The children had a fantastic day, and the activities fitted in with our Science topics perfectly. I'm sure this shall become a regular place to visit due to the fantastic opportunities the Carlton Marshes team are able to offer.

Year 6 Hands on Heritage

Following the end of a busy SAT's week, Kessingland Church of England Primary Academy had the pleasure of taking Year 6 pupils to Hands on Heritage. We are very lucky to be one of only a handful of schools who are invited to visit this unique site. Located in Tunstall Forest, near Snape, Hands on Heritage is run by dedicated and skilled volunteers, offering an insight into the life of our ancestors - primarily prehistoric to the Saxon period.

Throughout the two-day visit the children worked in small groups, experiencing a range of well-planned workshops, including pewter melting, fire lighting, whittling and weaving. During these activities the students learnt about their heritage and experienced the challenges of living and working in the past.







The children were also given the opportunity to excavate a reconstructed and buried Roman Villa, using archaeological techniques and equipment, and shown various artefacts, including pottery, jewellery and animal bones. The children then excavated the villa, processing finds, interpreting evidence and building a story of the site.







During our time on the site the pupils had plenty of time to build dens and explore the forest and the pupils all produced their own butter knife, pewter pendant and woven bracelet. Most importantly, everyone had experienced a unique opportunity to develop their confidence, self-esteem, communication skills and willingness to try new things. This is fantastic preparation for transition to high school.





From the pictures you can see that the old thatch has been removed, also surrounding the building new drainage has been installed with new soakaways and existing drainage and soakaways have been repaired and all are now working effectively.



The timbers / rafters in the attached pictures in picture one and 2 were in need of some repair and treatment before the new thatch can be put on the roof. This has now been completed as you will see in picture three.



The new thatch is currently being stored nearby and when all repairs have architects and engineers' inspection reports approved the rethatching will begin. We project that will start mid August.

HOW DOES IT WORK?

Food is donated by lovely people, like you, at drop off points. This is collected, sorted and distributed in food hampers to feed a family or individual for three days. Contents provide items for complete meals.

In addition Food Bank network helps people break free from poverty by providing additional support to help people resolve the crises they're facing so that they don't need to use a food bank again in the future.

This could include things like debt advice, mental health support, or benefits guidance. Food banks rely on the support of their local communities to support people in crisis.

DO LOCAL PEOPLE BENEFIT?

YES, Care professionals such as health visitors, staff at schools and social workers identify people in crisis and issue them with a food bank voucher. This means people can receive a food bank parcel of three days' nutritionally balanced, food from their local food bank.

What is a Digital Champion?

Digital Champions are people who help others go online safely and successfully if they want to. You don't need to be an IT whizz to be a Digital Champion – you just need a bit of time and enthusiasm to support others to experience the many benefits of the internet and digital technology. It is a great way of making a real difference to other people.

As a Digital Champion you'll be able to support others to learn the basics of computers and the internet in a relaxed, informal way. It starts with a positive conversation about digital as a choice to help people to do what matters to them. As a Champion, you can offer further support and information to people who want to go online learn how to use a computer for the first time or improve their confidence with the basics. Digital confidence and ability can help people learn new skills, find employment, or help small businesses be more productive.

Digital Champions work with learners remotely, on a one-to-one basis or in a small group. You can be a Digital Champion as part of your working role, as a volunteer or something you do in your day-to-day life. Being a Digital Champion does not involve set hours – you can choose when you would like to start and how much time you would like to commit.

What is the Suffolk Digital Champions Network?

The **Suffolk Digital Champions Network** is a collaborative, digital skills development project based in Suffolk.

More and more services are moving online, and some people are being left behind and becoming excluded. Once registered, you can access skills courses, technology guides, resources for helping learners and an online community of other Digital Champions where you can share ideas, questions, and experiences.




