



Suffolk Trading Standards – Latest News





With many people experiencing job losses or reduced income, people are looking for remote working jobs to bring in extra money. As such, we want to highlight the common scams that job seekers may experience to ensure you don't get caught out.

Scammers may reach out offering a job that promises a large amount of income for a small amount of work. If you respond, they may request you to provide them with a small amount of money for training or special equipment. Or they may request your bank account information so they can directly deposit your funds.

In reality, there is no job, or the work provided has many hurdles to jump, that means you won't get made. The work itself could involve filling envelopes, assembling products, or selling goods or services through your own website. In some cases, fraudsters may tell you there are faults with what you've done to avoid paying you. In other cases, the products you've bought or made are worthless. Many of these business opportunities only allow you to earn money if you introduce more people to it. These are known as pyramid schemes. In other cases, they will just take the money or the information you give them and use it to steal whatever money you have left. That's not to say there aren't legitimate work-from-home opportunities out there. You just have to do your research to make sure you're dealing with a real company. Do some research on the company and don't be afraid to contact it and ask questions before accepting a position, especially if it's asking for sensitive information. If you get a bad feeling, explore some other options instead.

Are you a victim of business opportunity fraud?

- You've received an email or letter, seen an advert, or landed on a website explaining how you can make easy money by working at home, or by setting up your own online business.
- You've paid money up front to register with the scheme, bought customer details, set up a new website, bought products to sell. However, the products are worthless.

What should you do if you've been a victim of business opportunity fraud?

- Report it to Action Fraud.
- Report any adverts for fraudulent business opportunities to the magazines, newspapers or web site operators that published them.
- If you are asked to involve other people in the scheme, don't.
- Keep any letters, emails or documents relating to the fraud as possible evidence.

Protect yourself against business opportunity fraud.

- Beware of adverts for business opportunities that state you can earn a specific or minimum amount of money.
- Any advert that tells you that you can sit back and let a business run itself is a good indication of fraudsters at work.
- Look out if the scheme operators give contact details that include mobile phone numbers beginning with 07 or web mail email addresses such as Yahoo or Outlook Genuine businesses do not use them.
- Don't be tempted by seemingly easy offers for work. You might find your personal details sold on to other scammers and you'll become seen as an easy target.

REPORT ON BIRDS AT MARSH LANE 2023

Introduction

2023 was the 19th successive year of monitoring bird populations at Marsh Lane, Kessingland, Suffolk. Volunteer members from Kessingland Ringing Group have maintained records of birds ringed during visits to the site. The group has eight licensed members although one was absent for most of the year. Guest ringers are also welcome to visit and two individuals ringed with us on four separate occasions. This report details the work carried out at the site and the data collected during 2023.

Abbreviations Used

BTO- British Trust for Ornithology / NRS- Nest Recording Scheme / PC- Parish Council

The Study Area

There are three areas used for ringing purposes:

- 1. Anglian Water Treatment Works- these are a valuable source of insect life, especially for wagtails, pipits and hirundines. The site is bordered by robust hedges, which provide cover and nesting opportunities for passerine birds.
- 2. Kessingland Parish Council land- this area is designated as Suffolk Wildlife Site No. DM29. This is mixed scrub and provides food and cover for a wide range of species, especially migrant warblers as well as breeding opportunities for resident and migrant birds. There are 12 bird boxes with hole-fronts placed across the site.
- **3. Private land owned by Mr John Briggs** this constitutes a spinney and adjoining area of reed-bed. The latter is attractive for migrant warblers in the Spring and Summer.

The three areas are mutually supportive for birds and the proximity to the coast attracts migrants in Spring and Autumn. The public have unhindered access to the PC land but dogs are not allowed. There is no public access to Anglian Water's locked site or to John Briggs' land. From the highest point of the site there is a clear view of Kessingland village to the north, the church to the west, the sea to the east and the turbines and part of Beach Farm to the south. The coastline is between 400-800m away from the site.


Methodology

Ringing activities are undertaken in each of these habitats according to the presence of birds, using mistnets with occasional use of whoosh nets and conventional traps. Tape lures are used periodically under licence. Ringing records are lodged with the BTO to be stored centrally on their database. Unusual sightings or high numbers of birds processed are reported to the County Bird Recorder. The nest boxes are monitored under the BTO's Nest Recording Scheme with full records of nesting attempts sent to the BTO.

Site Management

The scrub growth on the PC land, consisting of blackthorn and brambles, has become overgrown and leggy in places. The 2015 management plan drawn up by David Borderick as Warden, with the advice of Suffolk Wildlife Trust and with some input from Kessingland Ringing Group, provided for the cutting back of the overgrown scrub in blocks, based on a 7-year cycle so that the whole site will have been cleared by the 7th year, each block being allowed to grow back in the meantime. The sequence of cutting by year is shown overlead in Figure 1. Since the loss of David Borderick and the professional groundsman, this plan has been largely forgotten.

Management work is now being undertaken by a volunteer group led by David Boyle (Volunteer Marsh Warden) and David Fox (Volunteer Deputy Warden), using appropriate machinery with some advice from Kessingland Ringing Group. Some cut brush is burnt on site, some is used for brush piles. This year the area just inside the gate on the opposite side of the path has been cleared, as well as height cut away around the middle net lane, a clearing has been created in the small hawthorn spinney and some trees have been cut in the more mature spinney area.

The Records

Altogether, 39 recording visits were made in 2023. A total of 39 species were recorded, 5 less than the previous year. There were 1089 new birds ringed on the site compared to 796 in 2022.

It was a typical Spring in 2023 with average rainfall and expected daytime temperatures. There were, however, extremely cold overnight temperatures during late April and May. This had a negative impact on our resident early breeders, particularly tits, which had fewer successes and smaller broods. However, warmer, wetter weather in late Spring led to much higher productivity for migrants and second broods than the year before. In July 2023, 196 birds were ringed compared to just 87 in 2022 (2022 was notable for extreme heat and drought effect). Of the 196 birds ringed, 94% were juvenile birds hatched during the current calendar year. This resulted in good numbers of young birds on the wing in the Autumn at Marsh Lane. Winds in September and October were not favourable for migration from the Continent. However, movement of birds from the north of the UK was good, with 157 Meadow Pipit ringed between 14th September and 3rd October. 81 Lesser Redpolls were ringed between 30th September and 28th October with one control bird captured which was originally ringed in Northumberland (see Ringing Recoveries, below).

The financial cost incurred by the volunteer members of the group was £273.98 for rings and a cost of £330.00 (a third of their total value) for the use of 12 nets which have an average 3 year life span. The total cost of ringing at the site in 2023 was £603.98.

Ringing Records

Ringing is used to identify migration routes and summering or wintering areas. For instance it has helped to indicate that our Autumn Blackbirds mainly originate from Sweden and that our summering Blackcaps move south to Sussex before departing to the continent. Conversely it has shown that our wintering Blackcaps originate from central Europe, showing a change in migration strategy for these Continental birds. Bird ringing is also used as an important monitoring tool to demonstrate breeding populations and trends.

Annual ringing totals for 2023 are shown in Table 1, together with numbers for the previous 11 years. It should be noted that annual ringing totals are affected by weather, the structure of the ringing team, how many nets are set and their positions, and how many visits were attempted during the year.

Notable records for 2023 include our highest number of Blackcap ringed (175) since ringing began at the site in 2004. The table shows a steady increase in Blackcaps using this site as both a breeding and stop-over site during migration. We also had our highest ever total of Meadow Pipit ringed (157) with birds tape-lured on their Autumn migration southwards. We caught two juvenile Yellow Wagtails at the end of August, which was a first for the site. As Yellow Wagtails are farmland breeders, these two birds were definitely passing

through on their first migration. Sadly, we only caught one new Bullfinch in 2023. The area around Marsh Lane has always been a notable breeding site for these resident birds, particularly around the fishing lakes at the end of the lane. This indicates a drastic decline in these birds for reasons unknown. Greenfinch are also showing a serious decline with 91 new birds ringed in 2004, 56 in 2012 and just 11 in 2023. These resident birds have suffered a major decline nationally, partly due to the trichomonosis disease, but may also be in conjunction with other factors such as loss of habitat and lack of food sources.

Ringing Recoveries

Table 2 shows recoveries of birds more than 20km from Kessingland, and the origin of birds already ringed when captured (Controls). Local recoveries and recaptures of our own ringed birds are not recorded here but are passed on to the BTO.

The greatest distance travelled by one of our ringed birds was a Garden Warbler which was recaptured 696km away in France. We also had a report of a Nightingale (pictured), which was recaptured 2 years and 29 days later at a reserve in Essex. This bird was the first Nightingale ringed at Kessingland since 2004 (when 3 were ringed). It was heard in sub-song on the PC land for one day only. It's recapture in Essex shows that it was looking for a suitable nesting site at Kessingland in 2021 and subsequently found one 87km away. Nightingale have been declining in both number and range and are now only found to breed in a small area of southern and eastern England. The reasons for this decline are thought to encompass the degradation and loss of scrubby woodland



habitat upon which Nightingales depend to breed, including by browsing deer (BTO BirdFacts). Nightingales winter in West Africa, showing that this bird has survived migration across the Sahara and Europe six times during its life.

Nest Recording

The 12 nest boxes are monitored from the end of April until breeding evidence is complete. Each box is checked with information recorded on every visit about nest-building, egg stage, young stage, adult activity and nest outcome, even if the box has not been used. All young are monitored and ringed under licence once an appropriate age has been reached. All data from each visit is submitted to the BTO for the NRS.

There were nine boxes occupied in 2023. Only three boxes successfully fledged: two boxes of Blue Tits with broods of three and nine respectively, and one box of six Great Tits- 15 fledglings in total. Of the six failed nesting attempts, five failed at the egg stage with two boxes predated (probably by a mustelid), one box found with eggs broken, and two boxes had eggs deserted. One box of Blue Tit hatched eight young but all were found dead at an early stage.

In contrast, 10 boxes were occupied in 2022 which produced 57 fledged birds and there was only two box failures containing dead young. It ought to be noted that the same two boxes (numbered 11 and 12) failed at the young stage in both years and we would recommend that they be either slightly repositioned, or work carried out to provide more sunlight to the areas.

BDMLR is a UK based marine animal rescue organisation. We have nearly 3,000 active Marine Mammal Medics around the UK and are the only such specialist organisation covering England, Scotland and Wales.

Our BDMLR Marine Mammal Medic Course has been developed to educate and train members of the public on how to rescue stranded whales, dolphins, porpoises and seals. You do not need to be a diver and the minimum age is 18 years old.

The course consists of online lectures to be viewed prior to the course date, followed by a day of practical training using our life-sized (and weight!) whale, dolphin and seal models.

This is a full day course and the fee is £115. For this you will receive the online lectures, the day's training, one year's third party medic insurance, cloth medic badge, car stickers, a Medic ID card, a certificate and a copy of our internationally accredited Marine Mammal Medic Handbook, as well as your first year's subscription to BOMLR.

Please note that this is a dry course so you will not need a wetsuit/drysuit. Refreshments are not included so please bring a packed lunch.
