Labour MP for Lowestoft joins new Labour group in parliament standing up for coastal communities

Lowestoft, 3rd March 2025

The MP for Lowestoft, Beccles, and the villages has joined a new group of Labour MPs representing coastal seats who are pushing the government to take strong action to support coastal communities. Jess Asato MP said she was joining the group to ensure the voices of coastal communities like Lowestoft are heard loud and clear in government.

The group is being chaired by Polly Billington MP, one of a large number of new Labour MPs who took coastal seats off the Conservatives at the 2024 general election. Labour now has 66 MPs representing coastal parts of the country, including many in the East of England, meaning the group will have a strong voice in parliament when it comes to championing coastal towns.

After fourteen years under the Conservatives, many coastal areas suffer from above-average levels of deprivation and poorer health and educational attainment. The group say struggling economies and the terrible state of public services in these areas were the biggest reasons voters turned away from the Conservatives at the 2024 general election, and that the new government needed to prove it could turn that situation around. They say the key to this is ensuring the government deliver on their commitments to end the crisis in the NHS, fix public transport, tackle crime and antisocial behaviour, and put more money in people's pockets. The MPs have also expressed concern about the impact on coastal areas of plans that have been suggested by the Reform UK leader Nigel Farage, such as making people pay for health insurance to access the NHS.

The new group is holding regular meetings with government ministers to raise issues of high concern to voters in their communities. In particular, the Coastal Labour group are united in pushing hard for investment to deliver well-managed public services and a stronger economy in the coastal towns they represent. Chair of the Labour Coastal Group, Polly Billington MP said: "Voters in seats like mine rejected the Conservatives last year because Labour promised renewal, after fourteen years of Tory indifference to the unique challenges facing coastal towns. Now that we're in government we've got to prove to people that we can deliver on key issues like the NHS, tackling crime, and building a stronger economy. "That is why I am pleased to be chairing this new coastal grouping of Labour MPs, who will make sure that the voices of coastal areas across the country have their voices heard in government."

Jess Asato MP said: "Coastal communities like Lowestoft, Beccles, and our surrounding villages have been neglected for far too long, leaving people struggling with failing public services, poor transport links, and an economy that doesn't work for them. That's why I'm proud to be part of this new Labour group in Parliament, standing up for coastal areas and pushing for the investment and attention we deserve. This government is actively taking on the huge job of rebuilding trust and delivering real change. I'll continue to work tirelessly to ensure our coastal communities are at the heart of that mission."









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The Kessingland Chronicle Curriculum Special Edition, Spring 2025

Kelly Egleton (#HeadLearner): "Our priority at Kessingland is to ensure that children feel safe, happy and achieve well. As you will see from this following articles, the staff wanted to bring together some of the wonderful learning which has been taking place over this term. Designing a creative and ambitious curriculum and planning exciting and challenging lessons are our greatest passions and when we get these right, children love school. At Kessingland, it is our belief that what our children learn through pleasure, they never forget. We hope that you will enjoy reading about the exciting experiences being enjoyed by your children."

Nursery - Zebras

At the beginning of February, the whole school took part in Children's Mental Health Week. The Zebra Class (Nursery) also joined in many activities to help the children develop an understanding of what mental health is and how to look after ourselves.

Throughout the week the children were taught what the term "Mental Health" means. We used the book "The Colour Monster" by Anna Llenas as the main focus to discuss emotions. This is a book we share a lot with the children in Early Years as it links different colours to various emotions and introduces the children to the vocabulary associated with feelings.

The Nursery children enjoyed exploring "The Colour Monster" and we shared it together as a whole class. We talked about different times when we have felt certain emotions and then talked about things that make us feel happy. We drew pictures of these things and shared our ideas. We used the emotions mat to continue discussions around feelings and used the loose part resources to make different faces.



As part of Children's Mental Health Week, the Nursery children were also encouraged to think about things that make them feel angry or cross. Adults taught the children that it is OK to feel cross sometimes and together we talked about what makes us feel this way. The children were then supported to create a "Breathing Buddy" using paper cups and craft resources. They were taught that if they feel angry or cross, they can use their "Breathing Buddy" to take some deep breaths and this will help them to feel calmer.

The Nursery children are developing a number of strategies to help them to cope with big emotions! The adults were incredibly pleased with how hard the children worked throughout the week and are enormously proud of how much awareness they are developing about feelings and emotions. These skills will help all the children to become resilient and confident learners! *Miss Merrett*

Reception Class - Owls

During the last half term our topic was 'I wonder what is out there?' The children loved learning all about Space. Children enjoy investigating and exploring through play, so learning took place both inside the classroom, as well as outside. We began the topic reading the book 'Whatever Next'. The children used their imaginations re-enact the story using props. They designed and created their own rockets. Outside, we had a competition to see who could use the stomp rockets to launch their rocket furthest. One even went over the fence! This combined having fun with Maths and measuring distance. Some of the children enjoyed the challenge of making their own rockets and launching them at home!

There were rockets powered by throwing, blowing through straws and a homemade stomp rocket. We learnt the names and some facts about the planets. We sang a song to help us remember the order of the planets. We then used inflatable planets to place them in order from distance from the sun. We decided we quite like living on Earth!

Whilst thinking about planets, we also talked about aliens. We designed our own planets and aliens which could live there. We used masks to act out our stories outside on the stage. To conclude the topic, we learnt more about



what life would be like to be an astronaut. We learnt about the food which they eat and how they have to drink through straws. We watched clips of astronauts washing their hair and how they need to strap themselves in to sleep standing up. It led to us questioning what else would be tricky to do with in zero gravity, for example, how to go to the toilet! Finally, we enjoyed learning about Neil Armstrong, and watched the first moon landing. We have gained much more knowledge about Space during this topic in a fun and engaging way. *Mrs. Ward*

Year 1 – Flamingos

In Year 1, the children have been exploring balancing and jumping sequences during their PE lessons. These activities are designed to enhance their coordination, strength and body awareness, laying the foundation for more complex movements as they progress through school.

The lessons begin with a warm-up, where the children engage in dynamic stretches to prepare their muscles and joints for movement. They then move on to the core activities: balancing and jumping. The balancing exercises involve the children practicing standing on one foot in a range of different poses, carefully walking along a bench, and holding their position for 5 seconds. As the children advance to jumping, they are introduced to simple sequences that combine multiple movements.



They practice how to safely take off and land by bending their arms and knees and in a variety of different styles; one foot to two feet, two feet to two feet, two feet to one foot. The children are challenged to perform short jumping patterns, such as jumping off the bench, while maintaining control and precision in their landings.

Throughout these activities, the children are encouraged to use their imagination to create a short sequence involving two balances and a jump using benches and mats to support them. The activities not only strengthen their physical skills but also help develop their confidence and teamwork as they cheer each other on and learn to give each other constructive feedback.

By the end of the unit the children felt a great sense of accomplishment, having mastered some basic balance and jumping techniques. These skills are vital for their overall development, contributing to their growing physical literacy and readiness for more advanced movement patterns in the future. *Miss Macias*

Year 2 - Giraffes

In Year 2, the children have been learning about the Great Fire of London, an event that took place in 1666 and devastated much of the city. As part of their writing lessons, the children were asked to write a diary entry imagining that they were living through the fire. This activity helped them to understand the emotional and historical significance of the event and it encouraged them to think creatively about what it might have felt like during such a terrifying time.

The children used their imaginations and the information they had learned about the fire to write diary entries. They used their quills to describe the chaos of the

flames, the thick smoke and the fear that would have gripped people as the fire spread rapidly through London. Many children wrote about how the fire started in a bakery on Pudding Lane and quickly consumed the wooden buildings in its path. Some of the children wrote about the efforts to escape, with families trying to save their belongings or simply running for safety. The diary entries also reflected a sense of helplessness and disbelief.

The children described the sense of community as people came together to try to save their homes, though it was clear that the fire was too strong to stop. The children's writing shared the emotions of loss, fear and confusion as the fire raged for several days.

The children not only deepened their understanding of the Great Fire of London but also learned how to use their writing skills to express emotions and historical events in a personal way. *Miss Drake*

Year 3 - Meerkats

The Meerkats, Year 3 class demonstrated incredible dedication and enthusiasm during their final writing lesson of the half-term.

Despite it being the last day before a well-earned break, the children showed impressive focus as they carefully edited and refined their letters to Duncan (from 'The Day the Crayons Quit'), persuading him to choose their favourite colours.

They took great pride in improving their work and making thoughtful choices to strengthen their persuasive arguments. It was wonderful to see them fully engaged with the resources on their tables, using word mats, sentence starters and their own brilliant ideas to construct new and improved sentences. Their ability to recall key persuasive writing techniques, such as emotive language and rhetorical questions, was truly impressive.



We had really enjoyed this writing unit, focussing on the book and learning new techniques we can use to improve the quality of our written work. We had great fun learning and experimenting with new language to try and persuade others in our class through discussions about important issues such as climate change, recycling and food choices! We had also been focusing on keeping our handwriting neat and correctly formed and considering it was the last day, every child in the room enjoyed taking their time to craft some amazing sentences, with some beautifully written words!

The effort and creativity they poured into their writing resulted in some fantastic, convincing letters that would surely persuade Duncan to select their chosen colours! Well done, Meerkats – your hard work, perseverance and enthusiasm for learning were a joy to see! We all went home that afternoon feeling proud of the writing we had edited, polished and produced. A super end to the half term! *Mr. Griggs*

Year 4 - Lemurs

Year 4 had a great time during their computing unit on programming! Over the course of the unit, they explored coding in a fun and interactive way, learning how to create shapes and patterns.

The unit began by learning how to programme simple instructions using code blocks to make a turtle draw basic shapes like squares, triangles and hexagons.

As their confidence grew, they experimented with loops and colour changes, creating stunning, intricate patterns and eagerly testing different commands to see what designs they could produce.



As the unit progressed, they learned about debugging—fixing mistakes in their code. Instead of feeling frustrated, they became problem-solvers, excited to find and correct errors. By the end of the unit, each pupil had created their own digital artwork using code and they proudly showcased their work to each other.

The children loved seeing how programming could be both creative and logical. Many said they wanted to keep coding at home, inspired by the endless possibilities.

The Year 4 computing unit was not just about learning to code—it was about thinking, experimenting and having fun! *Mrs. Lytton*

Year 5 - Rhinos

A group of enthusiastic Year 5 pupils have been taking part in an inspiring intergenerational project run by Suffolk ArtLink, bringing history, creativity and community together. The project focuses on the grassroots history of Lowestoft, allowing the children to explore their town's rich heritage while engaging in creative activities.

Throughout the project, the pupils have dived into stories of local football, learning about the role the sport has played in the community over the years. Using their newfound knowledge, they have written poems, designed their own fictional football players and even built table football games - each one reflecting their unique perspective on the town's sporting legacy.



But the project isn't just about history and creativity; it's also about connection. The pupils recently visited a local care home, where they had the opportunity to share their work with the residents. The visit was a heartwarming experience, as the children read their poems aloud, presented their football-themed creations and played their handmade table football games with the residents. The room was filled with laughter, conversation and shared memories, bridging the generational gap in a truly meaningful way.


For many of the older residents, the children's work sparked nostalgic conversations about their own experiences with football in Lowestoft - whether as players, spectators, or supporters. In turn, the pupils gained a deeper appreciation of their town's history, learning firsthand from those who lived it. This intergenerational project has not only strengthened community ties but also encouraged creative expression and historical curiosity. Through art, storytelling and play, the pupils and residents have discovered that they have far more in common than they might have first imagined! *Miss Owen*

Year 6 - Lions

The Year 6 children have produced an impressive collection of non-chronological reports about their invented hexapods from the planet Pandora.

Each report showcases a carefully structured layout, including clear headings and subheadings, informative paragraphs, and detailed descriptions of their unique six-legged creatures.

The children have demonstrated their understanding of the key features of a non-chronological report by using formal and technical language, subject-specific vocabulary, and a range of sentence structures to engage the reader.




Their writing includes well-organised information, covering aspects such as habitat, diet, adaptations and behaviours, with some reports featuring labelled diagrams to enhance their explanations. They have also ensured grammatical accuracy, using a variety of cohesive devices, fronted adverbials, and relative clauses to add depth to their writing.


Punctuation has been used effectively, with commas, brackets, and dashes correctly applied to add extra detail, and spelling has been carefully checked to ensure precision.






The Kessingland Help In Need Trust was initially established in 1965 and its objective is to help those in need within the village. The kind of things we are able to help with are:-



I have a strong affection for the WI, whose members were integral to the war effort at home. My recipe was used by my own grandmother who lived through two world wars. Her recipe doesn't require mixers or whisks, and the batter will not curdle. This is my tribute to the women preserving food, and working firelessly using simple methods and ingredients in those times. I hope you enjoy making and eating my Ginger and Orange cake!"

gardener and Hull-born baker who won the fifth series of The
Great Birtish Bake Off in 2014. Motivated by protecting the
planet for her ten grandchildren, Nancy decided to change
how she used plastic, single use products and chemicals in her
home. Sharing her tips online, she amassed an engaged
international following of devoted fans interested not only in
her delicious recipes, but also her innovative ideas and
timescring swaps that rethink everyday house and garden
tasks to make as tittle an impact on the environment as tasks to make as little an impact on the environment as possible. Nancy worked as a GP practice manager in the NHS for thirty-six years until she relited in 2007. She lives in Lincolnshire with her husband, dogs and rescue hens.

Orange and Ginger Cake
This is a simple and classic bake and is made using The
Rubbing In Method – not often seen these days.

It's a recipe used by my grandmother who had lived through two world wars, and requires no specialist mixer or whisk and the batter will not curdle — a handy recipe if you have little or no equipment.

You will need: a mixing bowl and a 7 inch round cake tin greased and base-lined with paper or reusable baking parchment.

Preheat the oven to 180 degrees (fan) - 350f - gas mark 4.

Ingredients

Ingredients
200g self-raising flour
pinch solt
40g butter at room temperature
40g land at room temperature (or use all butter if preferred)
100g caster sugar
1 heaped tablespoon marmalade
Finely grated zest of 1 large orange plus the juice
1 tsp ground ginger
100ml milk

1 egg 80g stem ginger (from a jar of stem ginger in syrup)

1 tbsp demerara sugar or sugar nibs to sprinkle over. Alternatively add 3 tbsp icing sugar to a bowl, add 1.2 tsp orange or lemon juice, stir until smooth and runny then drizzle over using a spoon or piping nozzle.

1. Start by prepping the stem ginger – wash under the cold tap, dry on kitchen paper then cut into small dice and place into a bowl.

- 2. Take then 1 thsp of the recipe's weighed self-raising flour, add to the ginger and stir around to coat thoroughly, Set aside.
- 3. In a medium sized bowl place the self-raising flour, salt, butter and lard then rub in together just as you would for pastry. The mixture needs to be looking like fine breadcrumbs.
- 4. Add the ground ginger, sugar, zest, juice and marmalade and give a stir. Add then the egg followed by the milk which should be added a little at a time until you achieve a solt dropping consistency. You will probably need all of the milk but add it gradually just in case. If the batter is too thin the ginger will drop to the bottom of the cake whilst baking.
- 5. Finally fold in the chopped ginger.
- 6. Transfer to the prepared tin then sprinkle over either the demerara sugar or the sugar nibs or once completely cool drizzle over a simple icing.
- 7. Bake for 35-40 minutes until the cake is golden, risen and springy to the touch.
- 8. Leave to cool in the tin for at least 20 minutes before turning out onto a wire tray to cool completely.
- a couple of days but if you just cannot wait to eat it enjoy!
