From The Rectory Revd Mandy writes: November 2023

#### Remember, Honour, and seek to live in Peace

How often we see memorials to those who died in active service, this of course came about across the whole country after the horror of World War 1, when millions lost their lives. These memorials were and remain instrumental in providing moments for a nation to remember together, the consequences of war. There are countless memorials built in villages, towns, workplaces, schools, churches and town halls across our country.

This means that each relative, colleague and friend could be, and remains remembered in lots of ways, in the home, the community and nationally. We remember their sacrifice in search of peace, but surely we all want to strive for never having to rely on our young people to make such a sacrifice ever again. **WE REMEMBER THEM**. We must always remember them and the price they paid, and we must **HONOUR** that sacrifice by seeking to **be at peace with one another**.

But also, as lives lost quite properly from long ago, the recent past and current days are remembered; we also remember the actions that brought and bring that loveliness to lives at home and bring HOPE in the most difficult of circumstances, past and present, to families changed forever, because of those sacrifices. Death, life changing injuries, loneliness, separation, so much suffering. Injury, and we seek to bring peace to those who suffered and suffer through being lovely and good to them.

Think on these things says St Paul as his letter from 2000 years ago draws to a close, adding that the God of peace will be with those who hold fast, who turn from darkness to light, grounding their lives in Jesus Christ, and striving to be the peace... makers.

#### St Pauls letter to the Philippians: Chapter 4 verses 6-9

- <sup>6</sup> Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God.
- <sup>7</sup> And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.

- <sup>8</sup> Finally, beloved, whatever is true, whatever is honourable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is pleasing, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things.
- <sup>9</sup> Keep on doing the things that you have learned and received and heard and seen in me, and the God of peace will be with you.

On November 12th we will again remember the loss and the pain, we may even cry and weep when we acknowledge and see the trauma and suffering of current wars and conflicts, but we also remember, the courage and kindness, things that are true and pure and worthwhile, the loveliness and goodness of others.

As we remember all these things together, we find the courage to build the future To pray and work for peace, with our neighbours, our community and ourselves..... And to hold onto light and HOPE...

In doing this, working for peace, we remember, we pay tribute for lives lost, and we seek to heal. WE MUST STRIVE FOR PEACE......

#### **Kessingland CofE Primary Academy**



#### Centre of Excellence for Inclusion

Kessingland Church of England Primary Academy, run by Diocese of Norwich and Education Academies Trust (DNEAT), has retained its Centre of Excellence for Inclusion status awarded by IQM (Inclusion Quality Mark).

In a recent review inspection, both children and leaders are seen to be thriving. It highlights that 'At the heart of Kessingland Church of England Primary Academy there is significant work put into considering the whole child and the school has worked diligently with families and children to recognise the efforts of every pupil.'

Ms Shirley Young, IQM Assessor said: "I continue to be firmly of the opinion that the school fully meets the standard required by the Inclusion Quality Mark to maintain its status as a Centre of Excellence. I therefore recommend that the school retains its Centre of Excellence status and is reviewed again in 12 months."

The assessor's evaluation for the IQM award said, "The school learning environment is especially impressive as you walk around Kessingland school. The displays are vibrant, colourful, and often 3D. There is a consistent approach to them which runs from the nursery provision right the way through to Year 6. Many of the displays are interactive and children have worked alongside adults to create some specialist pieces. There are consistent reminders of the Thrive initiative through photographic evidence. Consistent use of the three roadways behaviour system and wherever books are displayed, there is a highly noticeable balance of cultures, equalities and topics relating to acceptance that can be seen throughout the school community."

Headteacher, Mr Adrian Crossland, said: "I am extremely proud of our wonderful school community. Everyone works extremely hard to create the inclusive, nurturing ethos that this award has recognised and we continue to seek ways of best supporting all our young people and their families."

Oliver Burwood CEO of DNEAT said: "The awarding of the centre of excellence status is a fantastic achievement. It reflects the work of this skilled and dedicated staff who are relentless in their efforts to make this a truly inclusive school. Everyone in our Trust are proud of Adrian and his team. Other schools within DNEAT gain an awful lot by visiting and working with the school on this vital area."

The Inclusion Quality Mark Award provides UK schools with a nationally recognised validation of their inclusive practice and ongoing commitment to developing educational inclusion and there are currently less than 250 schools in the UK who have the IQM Centre of Excellence for Inclusion status.









#### **Ancient Egypt Immersive Day**

At the start of term, Year 3 and Year 4 started off their new History topic, Ancient Egypt, by hosting an immersive day run by a company called Make the Classroom Disappear. The day was split into two parts, which included some time meeting an Ancient Egyptian scribe and a carousel of activities that helped the children develop their understanding of life in Ancient Egypt.

The day began with a visit from Sabef, an Ancient Egyptian scribe, and he taught us all about life as an Ancient Egyptian. Some of the activities he led included learning about the Egyptian number system, having a go at writing on wax tablets, making a mud brick and learning about the houses, by building a full-size house. The children then discovered how the Ancient Egyptians prepared people for burial, including the process of mummification.

During the afternoon, the children had the opportunity to explore objects such as copper tools, a hand quern for grinding grains and cosmetics that they applied to a mask. They also completed a quiz to develop their knowledge by searching through artefacts and information cards and played a game in which an Ancient Egyptian boy had to escape being eaten by crocodiles!

This immersive day was a fantastic start to our Ancient Egypt topic, and all of the children thoroughly enjoyed this unique learning experience. We would like to thank the Parish Council as we used some of the Youth Culture Funding to bring Making the Classroom Disappear into the school.

#### **Anglo Saxon Immersive Day**

The Year 5 and Year 6 pupils started the year by experiencing life as an Anglo Saxon – some of us even dressed-up for the event! Our themed day introduced our History topic on the Anglo Saxons and we began in AD449 when two Saxon brothers, Hengest and Horsa, were hired to fight for Britain. However, they later decided they liked it, turned against the current King and invaded.

Throughout the day we heard more about Anglo Saxon villages, jobs and feasting. In fact, we actually got to explore Anglo Saxon artefacts in a multi-sensory handling activity including wooden and bone tools, iron artefacts, foods and spices, grinding quern and trying on clothing. In one of our activities, we played 'Brunhild and the Wolves', a tense game of capture and defence where Brunhild attempts to collect the wood for the fire whilst avoiding the hungry wolves!

The day continued in the afternoon as we 'crossed the North Sea' - just like the Anglo Saxons – and built a full-size representation of an Anglo-Saxon boat. We got to explore house-building techniques using wood joints as well as wattle and daub. It was quite a surprise to find out that Anglo Saxons built houses with animal dung! Actually, some of the most gruesome information was saved for learning about crime and punishment: all of which are too grisly to describe here!

By the end of the day we had so much knowledge on the Anglo Saxons that we aced the retrieval quiz. But our time as Anglo Saxons is not over. In Forest School next week, we are going to feast on vegetables, craft earthenware and weave on a loom. In our next History lesson, we will learn how England was split into Northumbria, Wessex, Mercia and East Anglia.



We would like to thank the Parish Council for enabling us to bring this learning to life. We used some of the Youth Culture Fund to bring 'Making the Classroom Disappear' into the school and they really made the learning memorable.
